

A letter from the Minister

Dear Friends

We don't live by bread alone

It's Thursday afternoon in the middle of September and I am almost three weeks into being the minister for Hayes, Hayes End and North Hillingdon. I've attended meetings, led worship and been introduced to many different people. If I haven't met you yet, I hope to do so very soon. Please forgive me if I don't remember your name and you have to remind me a number of times. But more importantly, thank you for your warm and generous welcome. My family and I really appreciate it.

I am beginning to discover something of what it means to be a Methodist minister and the lifestyle changes. Not least is taking services at least once a Sunday. I am now standing in the pulpit or by the lectern, rather than sitting in the pew. And instead of listening to sermons, I am now preaching.

For many of us, the sermon includes both teaching and nurture. It is a way of receiving from God and being both encouraged and challenged. Yet what happens when you are the one who is preparing the sermon?

I guess some of you may face similar challenges if you are unable to get to church on a Sunday, whether because of shift work, illness or family and other commitments. How are you nurtured?

It is easier to participate in worship with others, whether it is through BBC's Songs of Praise, Premier Radio or worship CDs. There are daily Bible study notes from the Bible Reading Fellowship or other organisations you can follow. And you can join with tens of thousands of other Methodists in a monthly cycle of prayer through the Methodist Church's Prayer Handbook, 'A Word Transformed, available from Methodist Publishing (www.methodist.org.uk/prayerhandbook).

Jesus said, "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." (Matthew 4:4)

Also available on the Methodist Church website is their daily online Bible study 'A Word in Time' (www.methodist.org.uk/a-word-in-time). This follows a programme of Bible readings in the Prayer Handbook and includes a Bible study relating to the lectionary Gospel passage every Sunday. There are some notes to help you understand the passage, along with two or three questions to stimulate you and encourage you in your discipleship. There is even space to post your comments, Somebody who was no longer able to attend church has said that this had become their church.

I am also a fan of podcasts and subscribe to a couple of churches who put their sermons online. This way I can sit at the (virtual) feet of preachers and be fed by them. One I find most helpful is the series from Westminster Central Hall in London. If you listen to podcasts on your phone or another electronic device (or want to start) then search for them and subscribe. In these different ways, you can nurture your faith if you cannot get to worship, and receive "the word that comes from the mouth of God". Or you could do both.

But it would still be great to meet you in church on Sunday!

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness

Well, that Is how poet John Keats described autumn in his well-known poem entitled 'To Autumn', and although both October and November always herald the approach of winter, with its cold winds and dreary dark nights, nonetheless I feel autumn is one of the most colourful seasons in the year – possibly because my favourite colours range from yellows and oranges to beiges and browns. It's the time each year when you observe God at work every day with his paint brushes as leaves slowly take on some amazing changes from their summer greens to reds and golds until they finally give up the ghost and fall gently to the earth below, creating a warm, safe covering for seeds under the earth, who are waiting for their time to move and sprout up into the greens of springtime.

(According to the Internet, the start of autumn was the 22nd of September, but if memory serves that day was far from autumnal – dull, yes, with just a little sun but temperatures were in the mid-twenties!)

But back to this month: in our churches, unlike the leaves, nothing ever lies dormant, at least not for very long, and it is on the very first day of October that Bright Hour will hold their AGM – there will be a short report on this in the next mag., to keep everyone up-to-date with who does what.

Today many people regard October as the month when Halloween is celebrated; it is a time marked on their calendars. However, even though this can be an occasion for fun and 'trick or treating' for youngsters, not everyone is aware that it arises from an old pagan festival called Samhain. Apparently long ago the Celts regarded this date each year as the time when spirits who were roaming the atmosphere got close to our world! It was then they believed the dead would walk the earth again, so they thought if they left little 'treats' outside their doors those spirits would go away and not bother or frighten them! Quite a superstition.

However, although over the ages several of our Christian festivals have also arisen from pagan activities, the people of faith know better. The word 'Halloween' derives from 'All Hallows' Eve' - the night before 'All Saints' Day' that in Christian churches is celebrated on 1st of November – the date when thanks are given to God for all the saints of the world who, in their lifetimes, have gone beyond the call to serve their fellow men and God, and have been canonised by the church..

Names that immediately spring to my mind are Mother Theresa, Oscar Romero, Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther, but there are thousands and thousands gone before us and indeed, still today, there are in our midst countless souls of faith who continue to live to serve others in a world where there is so much need, just as there always has been: the great divide between the 'haves' and 'have nots'. Each one of these dear souls needs to be offered to God for his blessing and our grateful thanks as once again in 2018 Christians will meet to celebrate All Saints Day on Sunday the 1st of November.



So, by all means go ahead and have some fun as children dress up, knock on doors and do some 'trick or treating' and by eating hot dogs or whatever it is you like to do on the 31st of October, but never forget it is simply just 'having fun' and nothing else: that activity is of no importance whatsoever when compared with the need to remember people who, by their wonderful examples, have shown the world that we are all here to live in peace and to serve one another.

These are the men and women that everyone should celebrate and give thanks for: Those individuals who can be regarded as very real 'saints'. (and not, in my own opinion, just those 'officially' recognised by the church) Their ears have been open to the messages they have all received from God via his son Jesus, and they have not failed to act upon them. Wonderful examples for all of us to emulate.

"Parting is such sweet sorrow ..."

Five well known words from William Shakespeare in his play, 'Romeo and Juliet' as Juliet bids farewell to Romeo: that was the situation at Hayes End on Sunday 26th August when our Minister Andrew led his final service before leaving Hayes and starting his new appointment as Superintendent of the Circuit. It was, however, by no means an occasion of sorrow – far from it, and especially as we will occasionally still see Andrew and his wife Laura who now live not too far away.

It was a warm and family orientated service and began as Kathryn Clark presented her delightful little daughter Evie for baptism. Evie – plus mum - have been 'regulars' at our church for a number of years, ever since Evie was a babe in arms, and they are already regarded as established members of our church family.

Then to follow Evie's part in the service her mum Kathryn came forward to be confirmed by Andrew, as she declared her wish to follow Jesus for the rest of her days. To this we all say 'amen' and will keep both Kathryn and Evie in our prayers, asking for God's blessings to continue for them wherever life may lead them.

Andrew's theme that morning was the question "Who is this Jesus?" and in his message used that passage from scripture in John's gospel when Jesus is assuring his followers that he is going to prepare a place for them, and when Thomas asks "Master, we have no idea where you are going – how do you expect us to know the road?" the reply is "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life – no one gets to the Father except through me" Then Philip comments "Just show us the Father and we'll be satisfied"............. please get your bible and read on

Our challenge?

To ensure that we never miss an opportunity to tell others just who this Jesus is, and to assure them that if they choose to follow him they can be quite certain he has prepared a place for them too – those places are not just for the chosen few.

Much, much more was included by Andrew, that involved the sharing of assorted chocolates, an opportunity for us to select from a range of prayer aids and the singing of some great hymns all with positive relevance to his theme of knowing and of an understanding who Jesus is and that unquestionably the best thing for everyone to do is to follow him.

But that was not all – our Senior Steward, John then came forward to join with Andrew to share and offer a celebratory piece of prose that was written to mark Andrew's leaving. Rather too long for inclusion here in its entirety, it begins with words taken from Psalms 121 and 139, and then concludes as follows:

companion on the Way. Shelter and protect him from all harm, and anxiety. Grant him the courage to meet the future, and grace to let go into new life; through Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen. Andrew

Andrew's forehead)

Congregants: Go in peace, for our God goes with you.

Andrew: And also with you all, may God go with you.

(please ask John if you would like to see the full wording of this farewell dialogue)

The service continued as everyone was invited to share the Peace and the celebration of Holy Communion round the Lord's table.

As an almost final act in that morning's worship, our Steward Ajayi in his own inimitable fashion, offered a vote of thanks to Andrew together with a gift from the church family, followed by our worship leader Nicola who presented Laura with a colourful flower arrangement – Laura had been our musician that morning, (as she has on several occasions) and so also well deserving of our grateful thanks.

And then the service did conclude as we sang the words of the short, but most meaningful hymn, written by Joseph Hart –

This, this is the God we adore our faithful, unchangeable friend, whose love is as great as his power, and neither knows measure nor end. 'Tis Jesus, the first and the last, whose Spirit shall guide us safe home, we'll praise him for all that is past and trust him for all that's to come.

It was now time for our normal 'after-church refreshments' and not only that, some intrepid souls had prepared a barbecue luncheon for everyone – (we say intrepid as that day, and following a week of quite pleasant weather, heavy rain came down and it poured and poured, continuing non-stop until teatime!)

So, undaunted, the muscle men in our company quickly re-arranged chairs in the church and it was there that our meal was shared and enjoyed by many of the family before making their soggy journeys back home. (Our very sincere thanks to all those willing helpers who provided and cooked the food, who moved furniture and provided good fellowship)

So this brings to a conclusion our 'departure' bit, but with any departure there has to follow an 'arrival' and it was on the 31st of the month that our new minister Ken, together with his wife Jo and daughters Charlotte and Rebecca, received their official Circuit Welcome at the Ruislip church; one that was well attended and that also included greetings and a welcome into the Circuit of the Revd Lynita Conradie who will have pastoral care of Canon Lane, Eastcote and Pinner churches, also starting from 1st September.

The Church Modernisation Project

Bringing the Church Modernisation project to a successful conclusion has proved to be a tortuous exercise, especially when one realises that we first went out to tender back in March, and only now 6 months later have we accepted a quote for this work and appointed a Head Contractor to undertake the main bulk of the project work.

The original tender process confirmed a costing for the project of around 150K, way above the funds we had available. So we had to slightly change tack and on the advice of our Architect excluded some of the original elements which related to the Car Park. We are now working on a revised budget figure of 90K which is well within our financial capabilities having already raised over 65K from our own funds to finance this work.

The next stage is to enter into negotiations with our Grant Bodies, who may well reduce proportionally the grants offered towards this project. **SO FINALLY, AT LONG LAST WE HAVE CONFIRMED GOOD NEWS REGARDING OUR CHURCH MODERNISATION PLANS.** Now having received the rubber stamp from the Church Council it will be all systems go for starting this work in the New Year with completion in time for the Church Anniversary Celebrations in March.

The only down side will be that for a period of about 7 weeks in the New Year we will have to use the Hall for Sunday Worship. But I am sure you agree that's a small price to pay in the circumstances.

Hayes End Methodist Church End of 2017/18 Financial Report

From a financial perspective 2017/18 was another very encouraging year. A year in which we had two main objectives, which were:-



- 1. To build up the Church Modernisation Fund sufficiently so that the major changes to the front of the Church could be funded and undertaken in 2018 or 2019.
- 2. At the same time to maintain 'Business as Usual' as far as possible in the process. We can now thankfully confirm that these twin objectives have been achieved and we have also managed a surplus of £887.69 in the year on the General Fund and build up a Property Fund to finance future property expenditure.

Our good results were driven in the main by an increase in our Letting Income, which totalled £27,165.15 up from 8.8% in the previous year but continued good returns from Sunday Collections and Gift Aid also contributed to this situation. Copies of the full Church Financial situation will be available shortly when the accounts have been audited. But below I note the Fund situations at the end of this successful Financial Year.

PROPERTY PRIORITIES 2018/19 AND BEYOND

When considering our plans for our Church it must be noted that the Modernisation Project is only the end of the beginning and at our recent Church Council the following list of 'Major Item' priorities were agreed. It must also be noted these priorities form an important part of the overall Mission Vision for the development of our Church.

- ◆ INTEGRATED FIRE ALARM SYSTEM FOR THE BUILDING Cost around 10K.
- ◆ UPRATE OF IT FACILITIES IN THE WORSHIP AREA with large Plasma Screen TV's Cost a round 15K.
- ♦ MODERNISE AND REDECORATION OF LADIES & GENTS TOILETS. Cost around 5K.
- ◆ COMPLETE PHASE THREE OF THE CHURCH MODERNISATION PROJECT. Cost in excess of 25K.

This programme of work is very ambitious, but over 5 years with continuing Fund Raising efforts it is definitely achievable.

THE HAYES END MISSION PLAN

Over the past year we have devoted several meetings to considering our Mission Plan. Now at the Autumn Circuit Meeting it was agreed that we will now concentrate all efforts to encourage all Churches in the Circuit to produce their own Mission Action Plans. To confirm how importantly this matter is viewed it was also agreed that all churches must report back to the Circuit with their plans by next Easter. At Hayes End we are well on the road to being able to achieve this objective with the Church Leadership Team having already produced a first draft Mission Action Plan. The issue was also discussed at the recent Church Council and now we move to engage with as many people in the Church before we present our finalised Church Mission Plan - a working document for taking forward the vital work of our Church.



On Sunday 16th September The West London Battalion of The Boys' Brigade gathered together at Christ Church in Uxbridge for a Service led by Deacon Claire Gill, plus games, fellowship and food.

This event was held to celebrate the 20 years of The Battalion and it was good to see so many of the Old Hillingdon Battalion Companies represented at the event with the Companies from our Church and North Hillingdon at the forefront. Now we look forward to the next 20 years.

Here is Deacon Claire's monthly message for October – plenty for us to ponder

Dear Friends,

As a circuit we are continually seeking to discern a way forward for us as individual churches, and as a whole. At the recent Circuit Meeting all churches were asked to complete a Mission Action Plan, whereby each church identifies areas they would like to develop and sets realistic time frames to try and achieve these.

It may all sound rather alien to try and set targets in churches, but as most of you will have experienced over the years, there is a tendency to agree things at meetings which are then sadly not followed up.

As with any denomination, numbers at Sunday Worship are in decline, if we continue at our current rate then the future of the Methodist Church as a whole can appear bleak.

However, if we look at the rising needs in food poverty, social housing, knife and gun crime we see that our communities are in as much need as when Wesley first recognised that the world was crying out for change and for a voice to speak into peoples' lives.

We have that same mission and it is our responsibility to change our attitudes and no longer view church as something we just do on a Sunday.

We need to think of ourselves as 'Every day churches with an Everyday mission'. That our churches operate everyday and therefore every day we have a chance to further the mission of God, to give glimpses of hope, to provide a warm welcoming, safe space, where all are accepted, listened to and valued as Children of God.

So may we buck the trend of decline and continue to seek for ways in which we can offer something of worth to the many lost and lonely people of our communities.
