Inside out

One of the most embarrassing things I have done (although there's a long list) is spending half the day wearing a jumper inside out. It wasn't until late in the afternoon that someone pointed it out to me. And I just wondered how many people had spotted it and were laughing at my expense. I guess I'll never know!

I can't imagine the scribes and the Pharisees in Mark chapter 7 worrying about this sort of thing. As far as they are concerned they have far more important things on their mind – they're angry that Jesus' disciples are eating food when they haven't washed their hands correctly (according to religious law that is). So the Pharisees and teachers of the law take Jesus to task over the matter.

Jesus, however, is having none of this. He challenges their behaviour, saying you may do the right things on the outside, but you are rotten on the inside. And he quotes the prophet Isaiah (words that no doubt the Pharisees would have been familiar with) telling them that whilst they may honour God with their words, their hearts are far

away from God (Isaiah 29:13). They have placed their own human rituals above God's commandments.

Then to make strike the point home, Jesus draws people around him and tells them, that it is not what is on the outside that makes you unclean, but what comes out of you. So what is on the inside is what is important. To put it another way – "You can't judge a book by its cover!"

This question that this raises in me is "Why is God so interested in the state of our hearts?" And you need to bear in mind that in biblical times, the heart was viewed not just as the centre of our emotions, but the centre of our will, where decisions are made, about the direction of life. The heart is the essence of us — of you and me.

I believe that it is because God is interested and passionately concerned about us, the very us-ness of each of us. God is not so focused on what we do or say (although that has an importance), but on who we are. Because God is concerned about a relationship – a love and a care for us. And

that was why Jesus came for us. If all God was interested in what we do or how we behave, then God would have just provided a set of rules and regulations. And that was the mistake that the Pharisees made – they were so focused on the law, that they overlooked the love of a God who brought them out of slavery in Egypt, a God who led them on a journey to the Promised Land, a God who chose them and never rejected them, a God who returned them from exile in Babylonia. A God who was more concerned for them, than about the right or wrong people were washing their hands. God is more concerned about what is going on inside us (inside our hearts), and then how that is reflected out in that what we do and who we are, in response to God's love (if our heart is right with God, then we love because God first loved us - 1 John 4:19).

But God doesn't stop there. Go back to the words of Isaiah that Jesus quotes – about people honouring God with their lips but their hearts being far from God. But if you read further you'll discover that the very next thing God says is, "I will again do amazing things with these people, shocking and amazing." So God's goodness and God's powerful love can break through the deadening effect of any human ritual. There is nothing that God cannot do for us and with us.

God is with us. But more than that, God is working within us, so that what comes out of us bears witness to the love of God. As Jesus says, it is what is inside us that matters. But then what is inside us needs to be reflected outside us in how we share God's grace, and love our neighbour.

That's the best description of inside out that I can possibly imagine. And certainly, never something to be embarrassed by!
